#### International Law's Local Blindside, or: Reflecting on the Public and Private in Global Governance

Professor Peer Zumbansen

Inaugural Professor of Transnational Law and Founding Director of the Dickson Poon Transnational Law Institute (King's College London)



<u>Professor Zumbansen</u> will be speaking on International Law's Local Blindside, or: Reflecting on the Public and Private in Global Governance.

#### Abstract:

In recent years, economic and rational choice thinkers have shown considerable interest in some of public international law's central tenets, including the nature of international legal sovereignty, sources under Art. 38 ICJ Statute, or in principles concerning the use of force. Unsurprisingly, progressive international lawyers of variant degrees have been vigorous and steadfast in unmasking the individualist, if not anachronistic underpinnings of 'law and economics' newly found playground, effectively

calling into question the L&E scholars' disregard of the role of non-state actors, on the one hand, and of both legal pluralist and collectivist dimensions of international relations, on the other. Against this background, the lecture attempts to draw our attention to the domestic legal-political realm, where negotiations of sovereignty claims, justifications as well as contestations of state intervention or debates around the validity and legitimacy of norms in 'law' or 'non-law' occur on a daily basis, and often with very little reference to 'public' law. Building on this look at the 'domestic', we might be able to better recognise some of the continuities between ideology battles on the global and the local level.

Professor Zumbansen will be introduced by <u>recently appointed</u> <u>Emeritus Professor Wade</u> <u>Mansell</u>.
